Ask the expert Q&A

Q: I heard singing to your child is beneficial, what do you think about this?

A: Like all the best learning experiences in early childhood, music activities simultaneously promote development in multiple domains. Singing a lullaby while rocking a baby stimulates early language development, promotes attachment, and supports an infant's growing spatial awareness as the child experiences her body moving in space. Being intentional about integrating music into your program's daily routines—thinking through, "What do I want the children to learn from this music experience?"—helps you design and choose activities to support specific developmental goals.

How to Have Fun with Your Kids during the summer, Without Spending Money!

Here are some ways to spend quality time with your kids, keep them entertained during summer break, and not spend any money in the process.

Sing songs

Set up a tent in your back yard and camp out. This will save on gas commuting to some remote location, but you can still cook outside or roast marshmallows on the grill. Tell scary ghost stories and sing fun campfire songs.

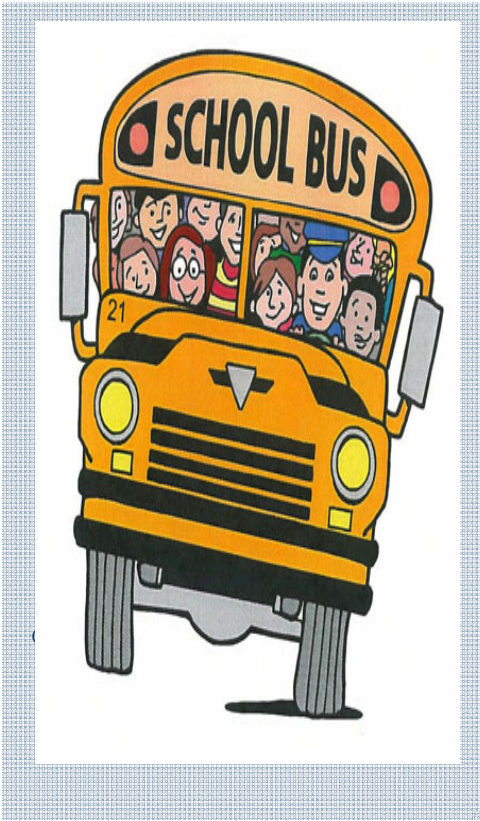
Summer Recipes

Getting School Ready, by Mrs. Shawn-

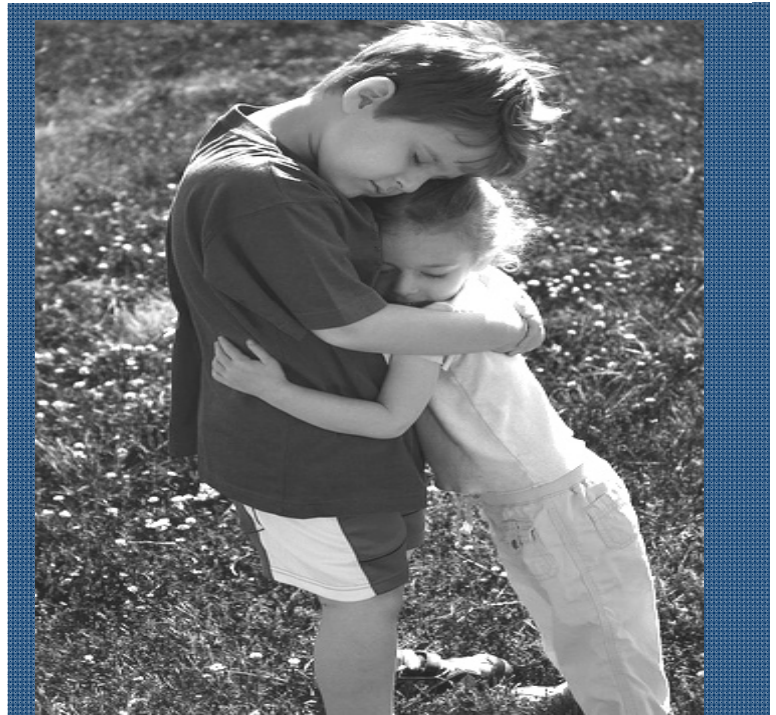
